COMMITMENT DEVOTIONAL GUIDE

Prayerful consideration is a phrase that we hear a lot during Commitment season. But what does it really mean? How do we prayerfully consider our Commitment for the upcoming year?

Many of us think of our decisions about charitable giving, or most other big financial decisions, as a study of numbers. Pen to paper, debits and credits and so on. It's hard work. It feels like rowing. This year, in the spirit of filling our sails with God's spirit, we encourage you to make sure that you bring God in to your decision-making process through prayer.

Try to set aside some time specifically to pray about your Commitment decisions. If you have a spouse or partner who shares financial decisions with you, pray together. Try praying aloud together. You may already have a prayer practice that works for you. Or consider using the outline on the next page to guide you.

PRAY FOR GUIDANCE

Here are steps for prayer inspired by Joan Gray, author of *Sailboat Church*, through her guide “Beginning Transforming Prayer”:

- Be present/show up. Just the urge to pray is God’s call to you, and you have listened!
- Thank God for His financial gifts.
- Tell God where you are. Financial decisions can be scary and emotional, and praying about them may not feel natural. Tell God how you feel as you embark on this prayerful journey.
- Read scripture. One of the best ways to hear God’s word is through reading scripture. Some suggestions on scriptures to read in the commitment season are: *1 Timothy 6:17-19, 2 Corinthians 9:6-8, Isaiah 43:15, Matthew 6:1-4, Matthew 6:19-21, Acts 2:43-45*. These verses are printed in this pamphlet.
- Talk to God about your goals for giving to Saint Luke’s of your time, talent and treasure. Pray about the giving goal you would like to set. How far away are you from tithing? What is the right goal for your household?
- Pray for God’s guidance in reaching those giving goals.
- Be silent for a few minutes and listen for God’s voice through your thoughts and inspirations.
- Close by slowly saying the Lord’s Prayer, paying special attention to the words of the prayer.
